#### College of Agriculture, Engineering and Technology welcomes new faculty member



#### A-State Graduate in Agricultural Education Selected for National Award

Mr. Robert Bollier, agricultural educator at Lexington Technology Center in Lexington, S.C., is one of six teachers selected nationwide to receive the National Association of Agricultural Educators Ideas Unlimited Award at the NAAE annual convention in Las Vegas on December 3<sup>rd</sup>. Mr. Bollier is a 1992 graduate of our college with a degree in Agricultural Education.

Mr. Bollier received his award based upon the development of a series of laboratory exercises all centered on an egg. These experiments allow him to incorporate math, science and critical thinking skills into his agriscience classroom. Each of the experiments reviews a different attribute of an ordinary egg and is designed for students to understand more about that attribute. One experiment focusses on the mass of an egg and how the different parts of the egg contribute to that mass. Another experiment looks at the porosity and permeability of the egg shell, and whether or not it

allows the passage of liquid through it. Most of the experiments can be done using eggs from a grocery store, but some do require fertilized chicken eggs.

Each of the six regional Ideas Unlimited winners was recognized at the NAAE convention in Las Vegas. National Geographic Learning | Cengage Learning sponsors the Ideas Unlimited Award. NAAE is the professional association for agricultural educators. Its mission is "professionals providing agricultural education for the global community through visionary leadership, advocacy and service." The NAAE office is located in Lexington, Ky.

On September 30, the College of Agriculture, Engineering and Technology held its annual Leadership Conference at the Convocation Center. This year's Leadership Conference celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Dr. David Agnew, Agricultural Education, and Dr. Bert Greenwalt, Agricultural Economics, recognized a need for student leadership development in our college. Since Dr. Agnew, and his wife, Nelvia, held similar leadership events at a previous university (University of Nebraska-Lincoln), the College of Agriculture experimented with its first Leadership Conference in

1992 at Park Inn in Jonesboro (with 3 students in attendance). This year's attendance

increased to over 70 students!



The two student facilitators this year were Mr. Ferrell Wiggins, Alpha Tau Alpha President, and Mr. Samuel King, Agribusiness Club President, They, along with other College club officers, discussed leadership opportunities in which students could become involved. Mrs. Spack, Office of Greek Life at ASU, also spoke about other leadership opportunities across the university.

The second session covered parliamentary procedure. Ms. Haylee Russaw, a senior in the college and accredited Parliamentarian by the Society of Agriculture Education Parliamentarians, lead a session discussing Robert's Rules of Order. Later, the students divided into groups, held their own mini meeting and followed Robert's Rules of Order.



The next session was a lecture about Conflict Management by Mr. Jock Boles, Newton County Farm Bureau President and Retired Extension Agent. The lecture included information about strategies for student leaders.

This year's Alumni Luncheon Speaker was Mr. Tom Baker, Director of the Agriculture Program and Career Pathways at Black River Tech. Mr. Baker was also the Alumni

Luncheon Speaker at the first Leadership Conference in 1992. At that time, he was a member of the Arkansas House of Representatives and the Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee. This year he spoke about the rise of the world population, the need for greater agricultural output, and how the US farmer was meeting that demand.

#### BILL & ALICE NIX PETTING ZOO Celebrates 10 years







In Fall 2006, the College of Agriculture began a free petting zoo on our farm at our beef barn facility. What began as a once per year event has now become a seasonal attraction (fall and spring) for our community.

Prior to the official petting zoo's opening, schools randomly contacted the farm and were given tours primarily of the swine and sheep areas. The petting zoo was created to allow for more interaction between our small visitors and a larger assortment of animals.

#### A GROWING ENDEAVOR

The petting zoo is now open twice a year, once in the spring and again in the fall. Animals on display in the zoo have been sheep, miniature donkeys, miniature horses, deer, ducks, chickens, pigs, llamas, bottle fed calves, turkeys, cats, dogs, goats, and rabbits, just to name a few. We try to have as many young offspring of the animals as we can, so children can pet both the adult and baby animals. A hayride throughout the farm is available on zoo weekdays. Long lines also wait outside the chick, duckling, and baby bunny petting areas.



#### A NEW NAME

In the spring of 2008, the name was officially changed to the Bill and Alice Nix Petting Zoo. The Nix's children have created an endowment to assist in supporting this endeavor. Their generosity has helped raise funds for general improvement of the facilities and expanded public relations for the petting zoo.

This semester the Bill & Alice Nix Petting Zoo was held on October 20 -23, 2016. Faculty, students and other volunteers made the petting zoo a big success.
