## CSG In the News

#### Lee's Research Accepted for Publication

An article co-authored by **Dr. Selye Lee**, assistant professor of criminology, and director of the criminal justice graduate program, has been accepted for publication in the journal *Crime and Delinquency*. The authors examined the relationship between poor parenting, frustration, impulsivity, and underage drinking. Based on the theoretical framework of Agnew's general strain theory (GST), their research study tested three structural models with national youth data.







#### Chapter by Stroud Included in New Book

A chapter written by **Dr. Bill Stroud**, professor of geography, is included in a book just published, *Justice in Climate Action Planning*. In his chapter, Stroud focuses on the case of pre-platted communities that were built in the 1950s and 1960s without adequate regard for climate change considerations. Developers were focused instead on aesthetics and the value of amenities in southwest Floridian landscapes.
