BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees of Arkansas State University serve as a board of management and control of Arkansas State University campuses in Jonesboro, Beebe, Newport, Mountain Home and Heber Springs; degree centers of the university at sites in Blytheville, Forrest City and West Memphis; and other academic programs throughout the state.

In this capacity, the Trustees hire the Arkansas State University president to serve as the Chief Executive Officer, approve the curriculum of the institution, annually approve an operating budget, establish policies for the efficient operation of the institution, and approve those matters which require participation of the governing board of the University. Trustees' duties include: appointing, supporting, and assessing the performance of the president; maintaining the clarity of the mission of Arkansas State University; approving long-range plans; approving the educational program; ensuring the well-being of the students, faculty and staff; ensuring strong financial management; approving significant faculty and staff appointments and dismissals; ensuring adequate resources for quality programs; preserving institutional autonomy; interpreting the campus to the community; and interpreting the needs of society to the campus.

The governor of Arkansas appoints members of the Board of Trustees for a period of five years. The Senate of the General Assembly must confirm each appointment.

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro Mission Statement:

Arkansas State University educates leaders, enhances intellectual growth and enriches lives.

ASU's main campus in Jonesboro is located in Northeast Arkansas. Jonesboro is the fifth largest populace city in the state and has a trade, cultural and medical center for a market area of more than a half million people.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro (ASUJ) was established in 1909 as a state agriculture school. The institution opened as a vocational high school in 1910 and changed to State Agricultural and Mechanical College in 1925. Authority to extend the curriculum, offer senior college work and grant degrees was given to the institution by the legislature in 1925. Senior college work was initiated in 1930, and the first bachelor's degrees were granted in 1931. In 1933, the legislature changed the name of the college to Arkansas State College. Master's degree graduate programs were initiated in 1955 and Doctorate degree programs were added in 1999. Arkansas State College was granted university status in January 1967.

Since 1909, the institution that evolved into ASUJ has been served by twelve presidents/chancellors.

HISTORY

As the oldest two-year college in the state, ASU-Beebe (ASUB) has paved the way in making a quality education affordable and attainable for Central Arkansas students. ASUB celebrated its eightieth anniversary in 2007, originally opening its doors as Junior Agricultural School of Central Arkansas in 1927 after Beebe citizens donated 300 acres of land to start the school. In 1931, the name was changed to Junior Agricultural College of Central Arkansas, and a college curriculum was established. The college has been affiliated with the Arkansas State University System since 1955, when it became a sister campus of Arkansas State College.

ASUB has established a strong reputation of providing quality, affordable instruction and service programs to its surrounding communities. HISTORY

In 1991, the Arkansas General Assembly created technical colleges from the Baxter County Vocational-Technical Center and the North Arkansas Community/Technical College Center in Mountain Home. Mountain Home Technical College was established on July 1, 1991. In 1992, the Mountain Home Technical College agreed to seek affiliation with Arkansas State University-Jonesboro to form a sister campus. On July 1, 1993, Mountain Home Technical College became Arkansas State University Mountain Home Technical College.

Arkansas State University-Mountain Home (ASUMH) was established on July 1, 1995 due to the commitment of the residents of Baxter County and the cooperation of the Department of Higher Education and Arkansas State University in Jonesboro.

ASUMH has an open door admissions policy. This policy is designed to enhance access to educational opportunities. Standards of quality are maintained and students are required to remove deficiencies before entering certain programs or courses.

Nestled in the beautiful Ozark Mountains, 156 miles north of Little Rock, the environment at ASUMH encourages free expression, leadership and innovation. Additionally, the construction of a new campus accommodating 1,200 students offers an even more appealing setting for students to pursue higher education.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

An Associate of Arts is offered for those students needing maximum flexibility in the selection of a course of study to meet individual employment and educational needs. It can be designed to meet the General Education requirements for those individuals planning to transfer to a four-year institution in order to complete a bachelor's degree. Associates of Applied Science are offered in Business Management, Crime Scene Investigation, Criminal Justice, Funeral Science, Information Systems Technology, Law Enforcement Administration, Paramedic Technology and Respiratory Care. Also offered is an Associate of Art in General Education and Teaching and an Associate of Science in Business. Master's degrees are offered in Business Administration, Curriculum and Instruction, and Educational Leadership.

HISTORY

Arkansas State University-Newport (ASUN) has been in continuous operation since August 1975. Prior to being named ASU-Newport, the campus was known as White River Vocational Technical School. In 1991, the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 1244 which merged White River Vocational Technical School with ASU-Beebe. In 1992, it became ASU-Beebe/Newport and in 1997 became ASU-Newport. The 83rd General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature passed Act 297 into law on February 19, 2001, creating a separate budget appropriation for ASUN effective July 1, 2001. The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Accreditation Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) granted the college initial accreditation for stand-alone status for five years in August 2002. In April 2007, the college received ten year accreditation status from the NCA. In March 2001, the state legislature approved the merger of Delta Technical Institute with Arkansas State University to produce the ASU Technical Center (ASUTC). In 2008, ASUTC was aligned with ASUN.

PROGRAMS OF STUDY

Programs and services are designed to assist students (both traditional and nontraditional) in determining and achieving their educational, personal and career goals.

These programs and services include associate degrees, certificates, continuing education, workforce development, adult education, ESL, and opportunities through the Career Pathways program.

The college offers transfer degree programs, including a new online degree (AA in Liberal Arts), an AA degree in Teaching (including Middle School and P-4 grade options) and Computer Information Systems, applied science degrees (including RN and General Technology with an emphasis in such areas as High Voltage Lineman Technology), technical certificates in such areas as Practical Nursing, Business Technology, High Voltage Lineman Technology, and Diesel Mechanics and certificates of proficiency in such diverse areas as CNA and Truck Driver Training (the largest commercial driver training program in the state).

Partnering with business and industry and working to meet the local, county and regional needs of its students and employers, ASU-Newport is truly a "Great Place to Start."

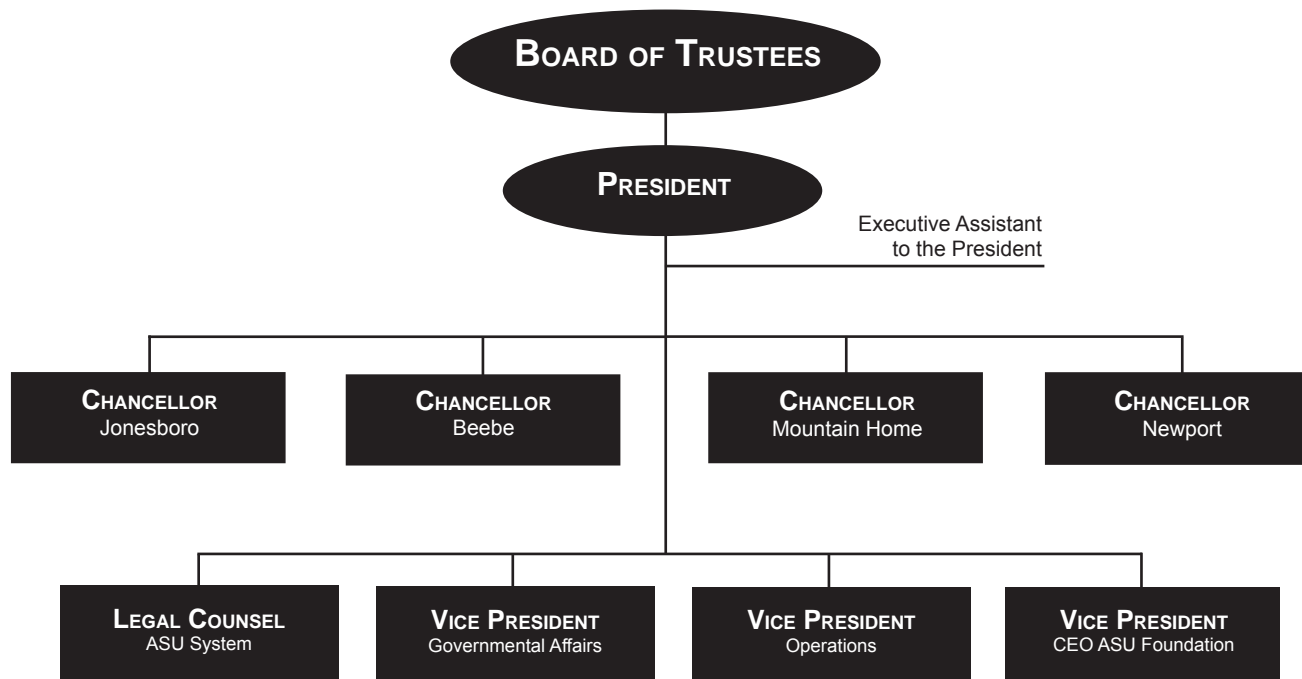

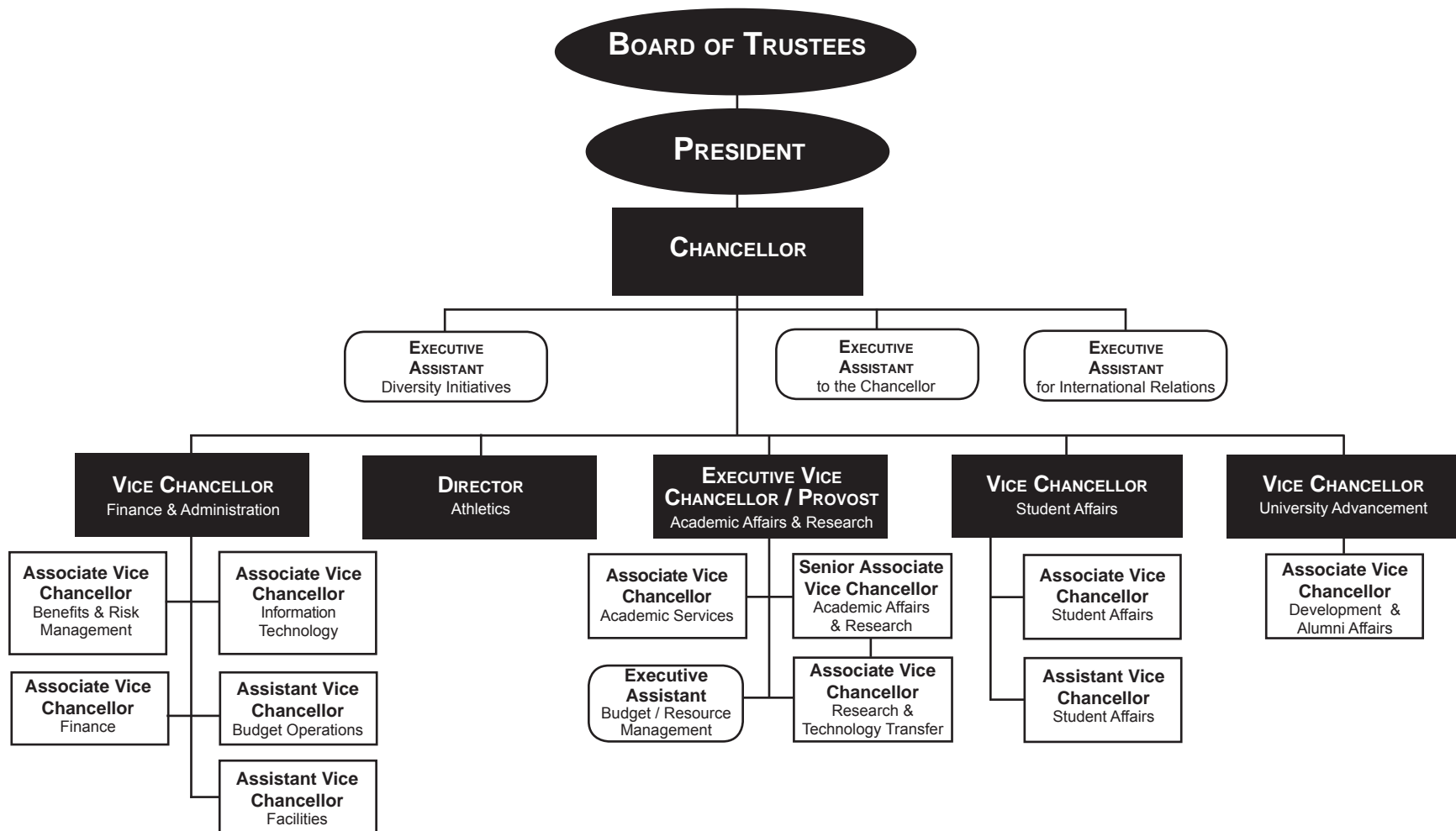
2010-2011 Organizational Structure

2010-2011 Organizational Structure

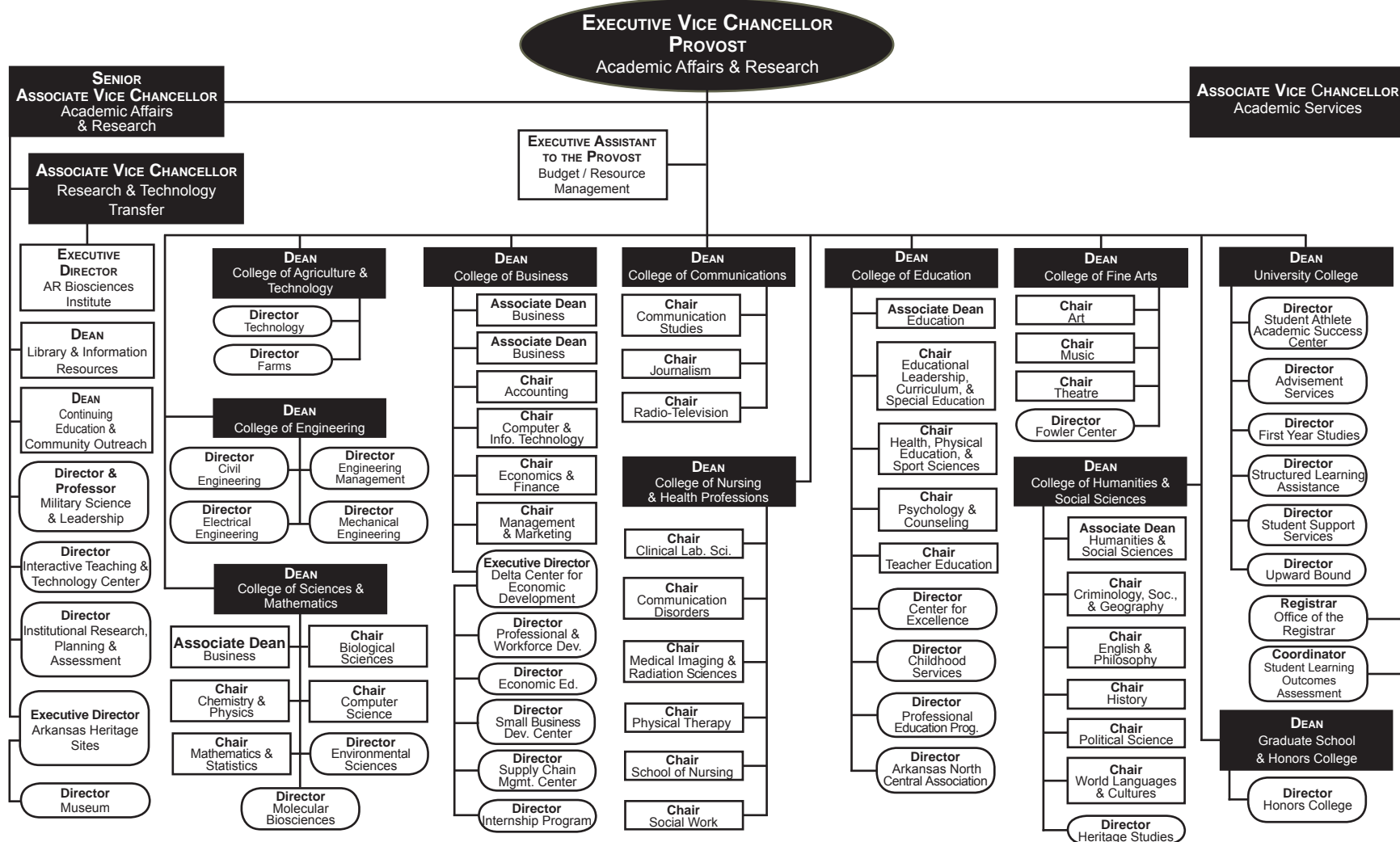

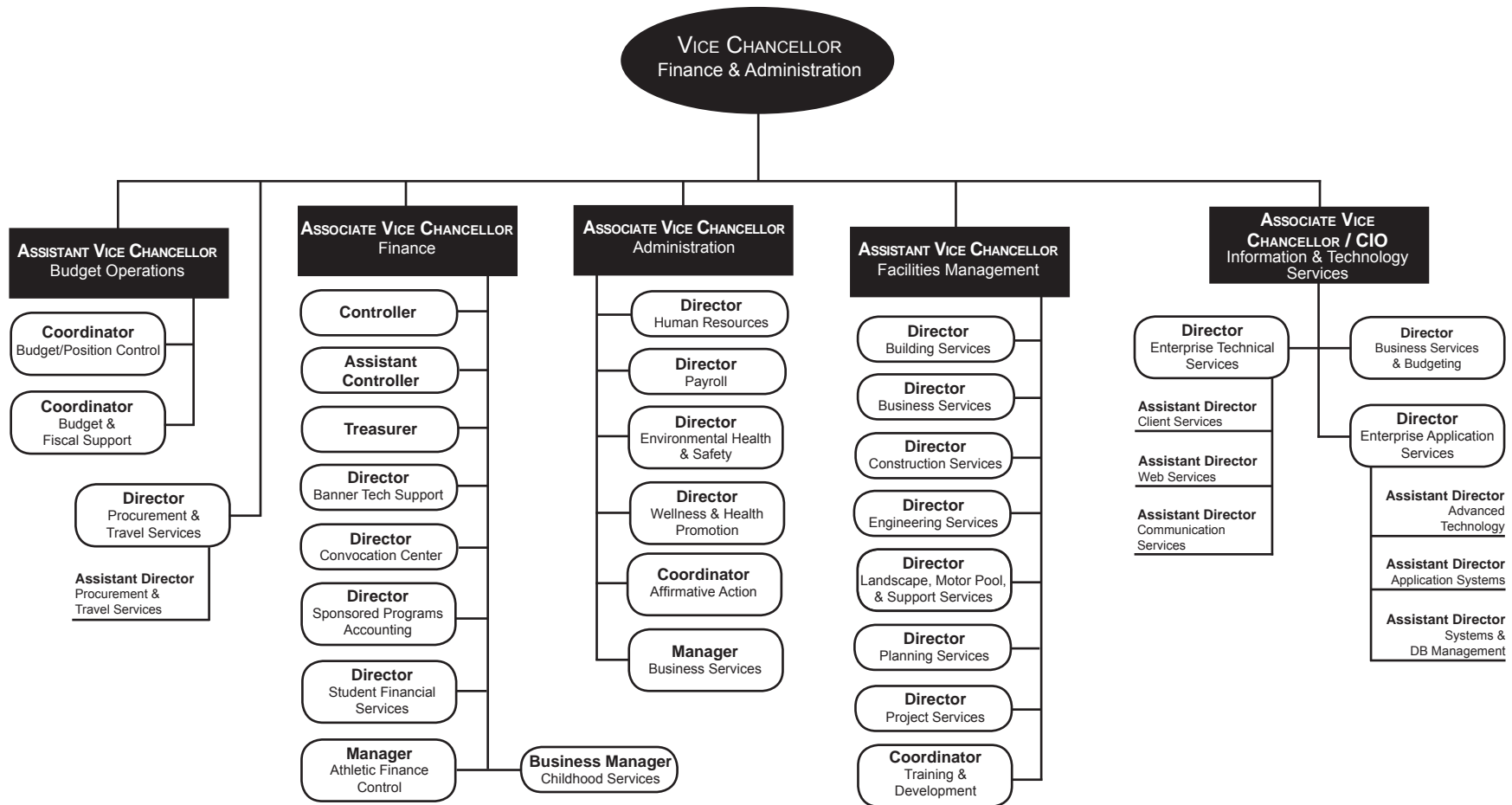

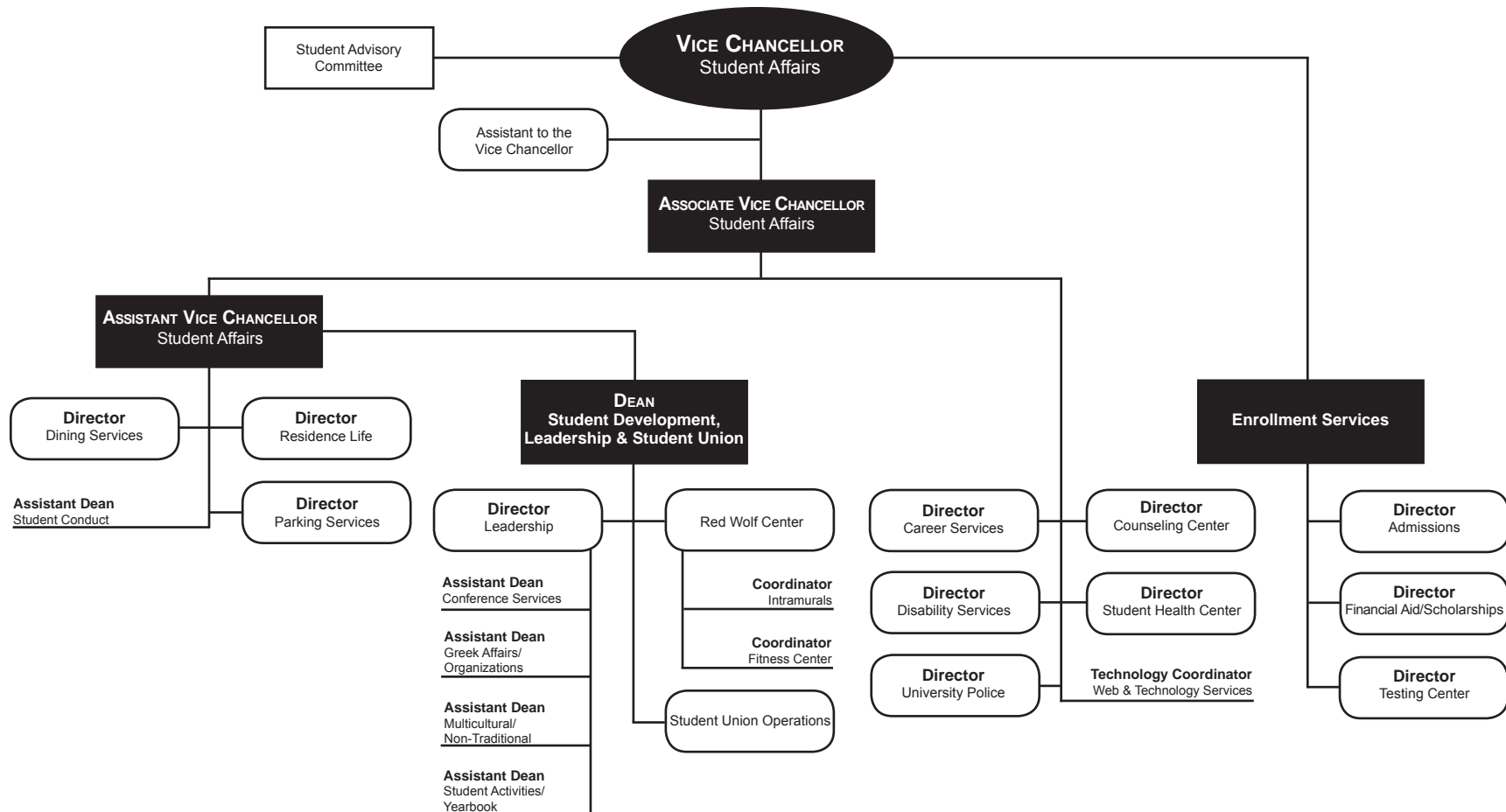

Differences in institutional size (*number of degrees*), role (*types of degrees*), breadth of program offerings (*number of program areas in which degrees are granted*), and comprehensiveness (*distribution of degrees across program areas*) are the factors upon which institutions are classified.

Institutions are assigned to categories for a report year using the previous academic year's data on program completions. To keep the statistical comparison groups relatively stable over time and to assure that institutions change categories only when their measures on a criterion are relatively stable, institutions change categories when they meet the criterion for another category for the third consecutive year.

♦**Four-Year 1:** Institutions awarding at least 100 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories (2-digit classification) with no more than 50 percent in any one category. (*University of Arkansas-Fayetteville*)

♦**Four-Year 2:** Institutions awarding at least 30 doctoral degrees distributed among at least 5 CIP categories.

♦**Four-Year 3:** Institutions awarding at least 100 master's, education specialist, post-master's, or doctoral degrees with master's, education specialist, and post-master's degrees distributed among at least 10 CIP categories. (*Arkansas State University-Jonesboro, University of Arkansas-Little Rock, University of Central Arkansas*)

♦**Two-Year 2:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of between 2,000 and 4,999. (*Arkansas State University-Beebe*)

♦**Two-Year 3:** Institutions awarding associate degrees and offering college transfer courses with FTE enrollment of less than 2,000. (*Arkansas State University-Mountain Home, Arkansas State University-Newport*)

CARNEGIE CLASSIFICATION

The Carnegie Commission developed a classification of colleges and universities to support its program of research and policy analysis. With the 2005 revision, the single classification was replaced by a set of multiple, parallel classifications. They are organized around three fundamental questions: what is taught (*Undergraduate & Graduate Instructional Programs*), who are the students (*Enrollment Profile & Undergraduate Profile*), and what is the setting (*Size & Setting*).

ASUJ's Classifications by Category*

Basic: (Master's L - Master's Colleges and Universities with larger programs) *Generally includes institutions that award at least 50 master's degrees and fewer than 20 doctoral degrees per year.*

Size & Setting: (M4/NR - Medium four-year, primarily nonresidential) *Fall FTE enrollment of 3,000 - 9,999 degree seeking students at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. Fewer than 25% of degree-seeking undergraduates live on campus.*

Enrollment Profile: (VHU - Very high undergraduate) *Fall enrollment data show both undergraduate and graduate/professional students, with the graduate enrollment accounting for less than 10% of FTE enrollment.*

Undergraduate Profile: (FT4/I - Full-time four-year, inclusive) *Fall enrollment data show at least 80% of undergraduates enrolled full-time at these bachelor's degree granting institutions. At these institutions test scores indicate that they extend educational opportunity to a wide range of students with respect to academic preparation and achievement.*

Undergraduate Instructional Program: (Prof+A&S/SGC - Professions plus arts & sciences, some graduate coexistence) *60-79% of bachelor's degree majors were in professional fields, and graduate degrees were observed in some of the fields corresponding to undergraduate majors (but less than half).*

Graduate Instructional Program: (Doc/Prof - Doctoral, professions dominant) *These institutions award doctoral degrees in a range of fields, with the plurality in the professions other than engineering (such as education, health professions, public policy, or social work).*

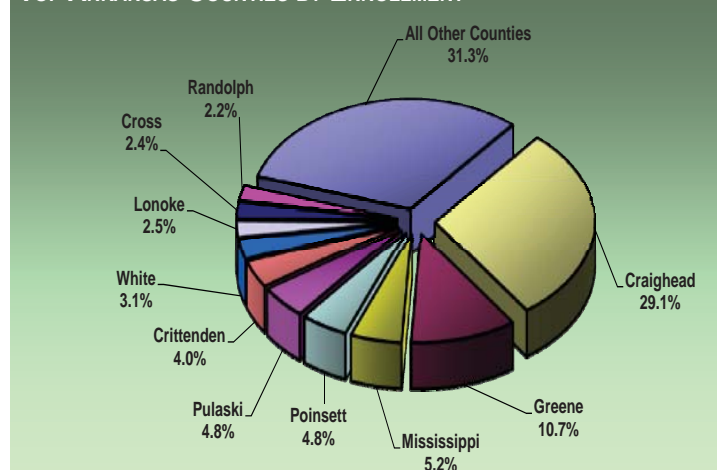

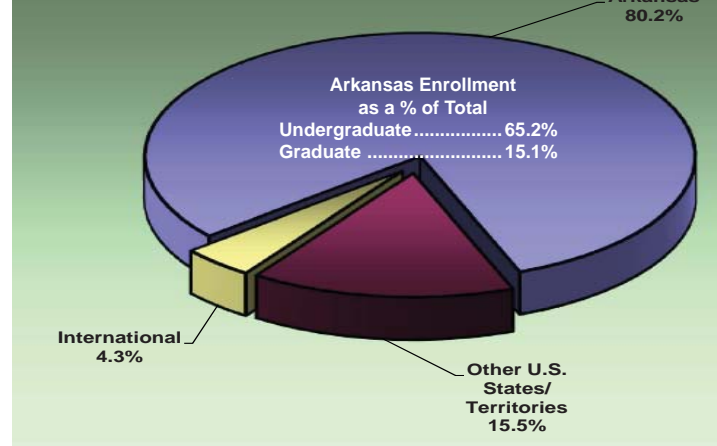

ENROLLMENT BY GEOGRAPHIC ORIGIN

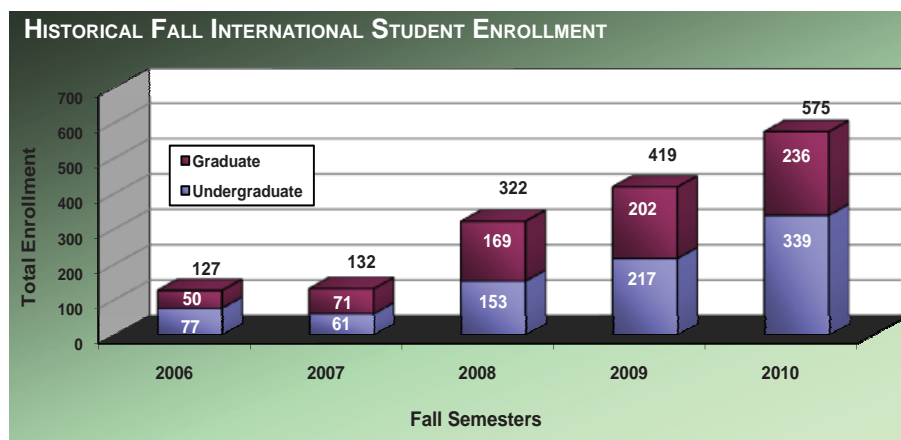
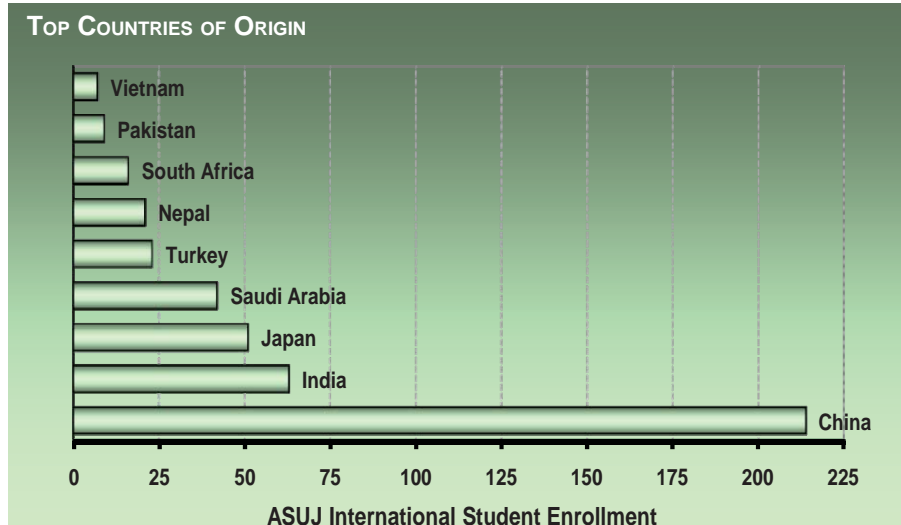

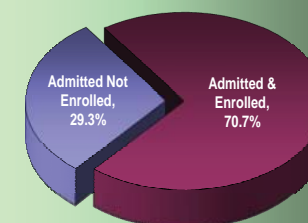

First-Time Admitted Applicants by Enrollment Status

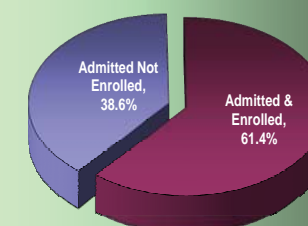

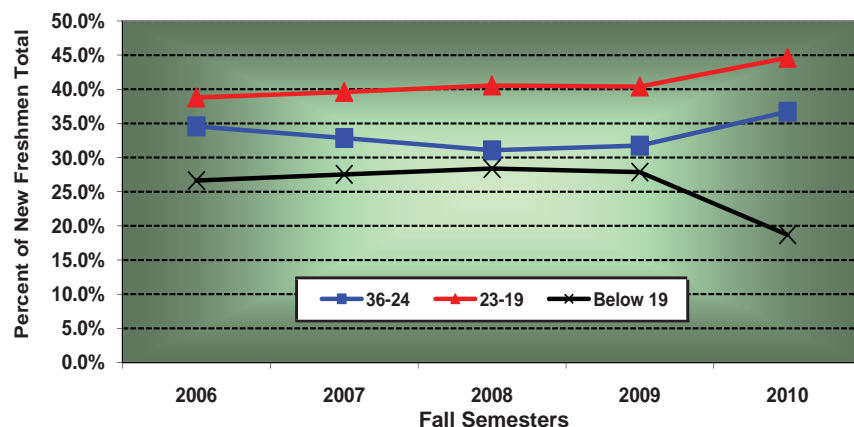

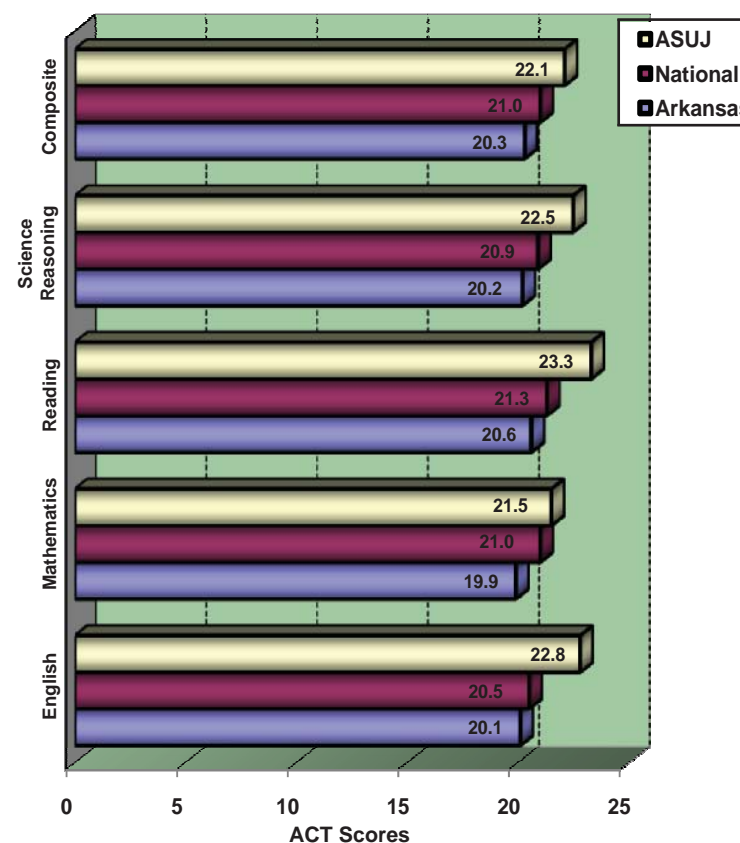

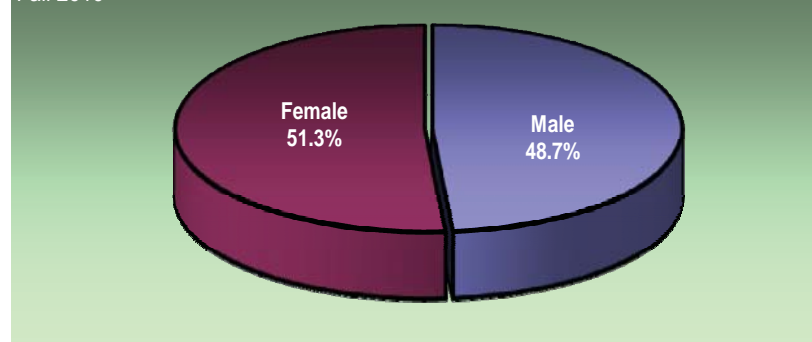

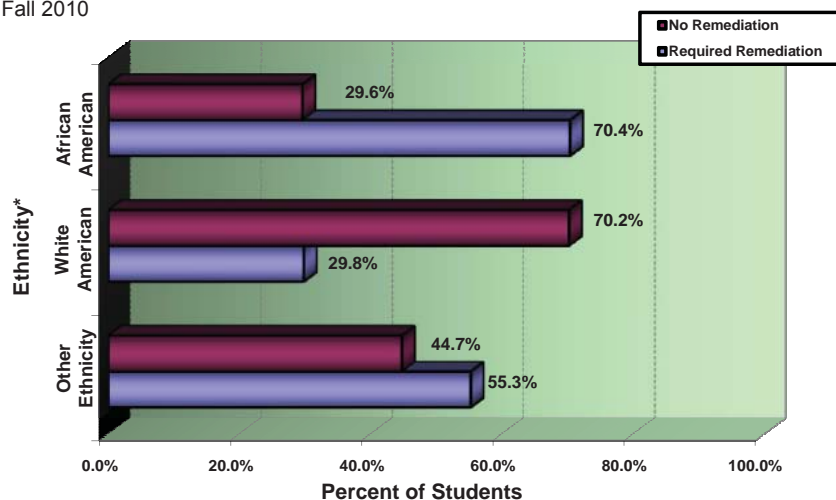

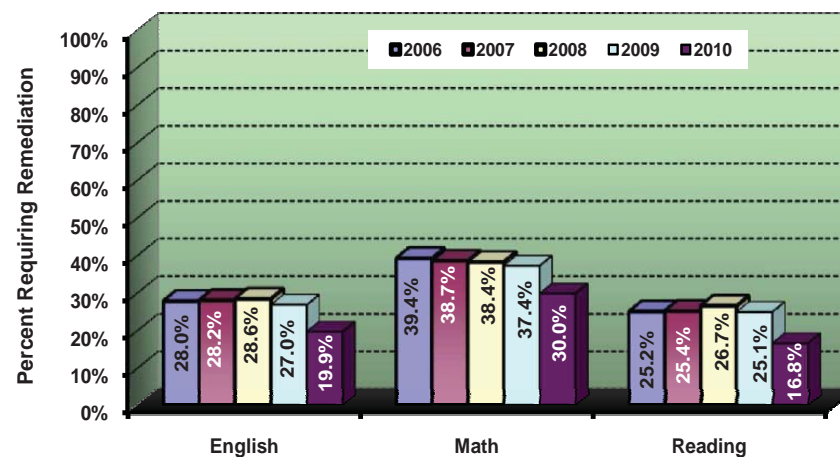
GENDER DISTRIBUTION OF FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN REQUIRING REMEDIATION

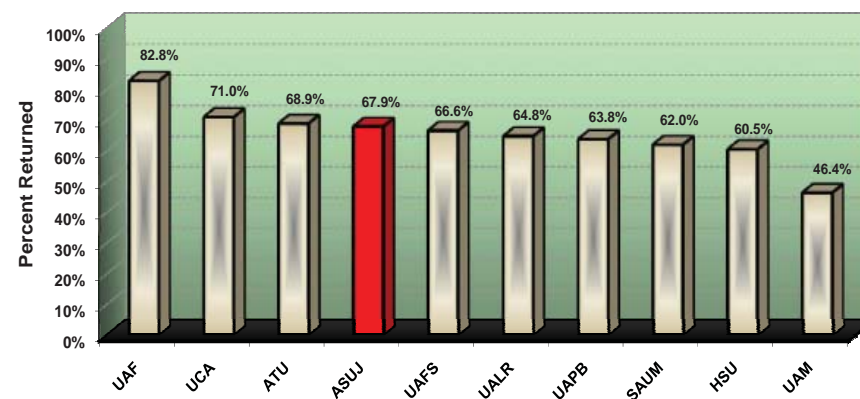

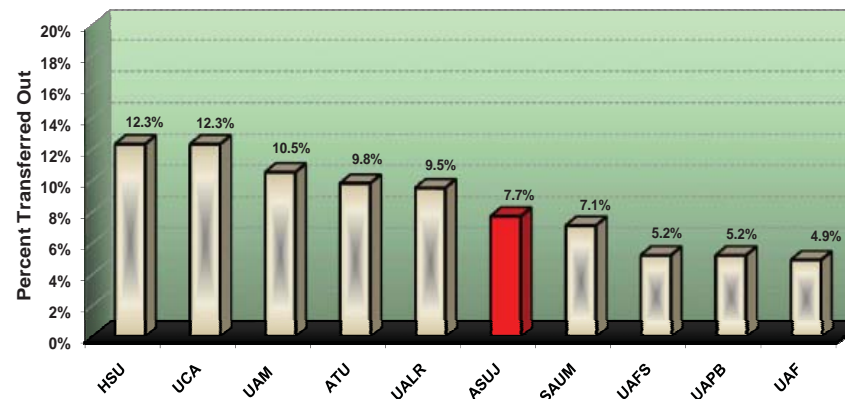

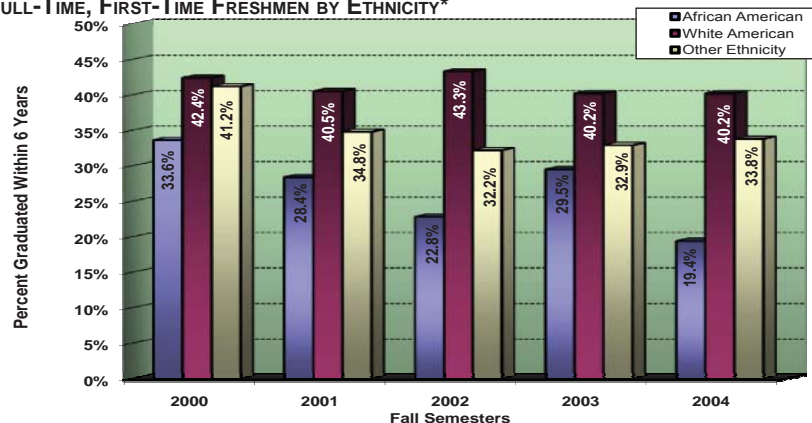

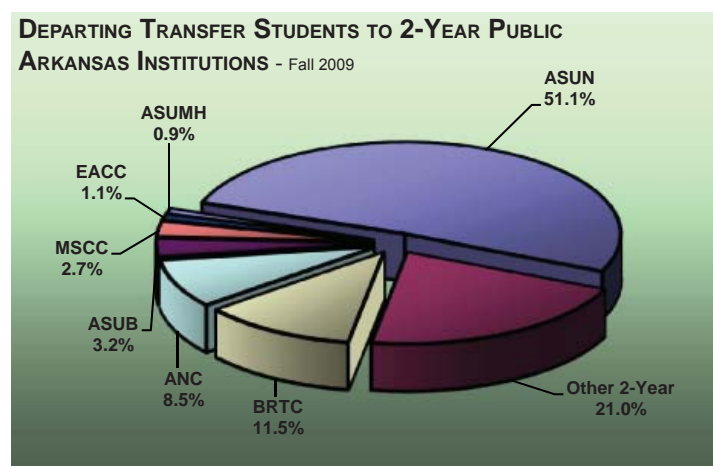

AFFILIATION:

Arkansas State University-Jonesboro fields 16 sports - seven for men and nine for women - in NCAA Division I. ASUJ's football program competes in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

CONFERENCE:

ASUJ belongs to the Sun Belt Conference in all sports with the exception of bowling.

ACADEMICS:

- ◆ 124 ASUJ student-athletes were named to the Sun Belt Conference Commissioner's List or Academic Honor Roll.
- ◆ For the fifth time in the past six years, the football team captured the Sun Belt Conference academic award for holding the highest GPA in the league.
- ◆ 139 student-athletes were named to the spring 2009 Athletic Director's Honor Roll including 19 with a 4.0 GPA.
- ◆ 165 student-athletes were named to the fall 2009 Athletic Director's Honor Roll, including 32 with a 4.0 GPA.
- ◆ Senior defensive end Alex Carrington was named ESPN the magazine Academic All-District VI.

COMPETITIVE PERFORMANCE:

- ◆ ASUJ Athletics didn't take just a small step towards improvement in the Sun Belt Conference's annual Bubas Cup all-sports standings in 2009-10, it took a big leap up to fourth place in the final standings for a six-place turnaround over the previous year and its best results in a decade.
- ◆ Alex Carrington, a four-year football letterman at ASUJ from 2006-09, was named the Sun Belt Conference's 2009-10 Male Student-Athlete of the Year, marking the first time an ASUJ student-athlete has ever received the league's most prestigious annual honor issued for both academic and athletic achievements.
- ◆ Senior quarterback Corey Leonard was named the Sun Belt Conference Preseason Co-Offensive Player of the Year and senior defensive end Alex Carrington the league's Preseason Defensive Player of the Year.
- ◆ The volleyball team recorded 22 regular-season wins

and posted a 12-6 Sun Belt Conference record to finish as the league's West Division co-champions.

- ◆ The women's soccer team set school records for overall wins (8) and Sun Belt Conference victories (5). The team not only qualified for the Sun Belt Conference tournament for the first time since 2004, it also picked up a first-round win for the first time in school history.
- ◆ The baseball team finished the season with a 30-28 record, its best since 2005, and advanced to the Sun Belt Conference Tournament semifinals for the first time since 1996. ASUJ recorded its most Sun Belt Conference victories (16) since 1995 and second most wins ever in any conference.
- ◆ The ASUJ men's basketball team finished the season 17-14 and in second place in the Sun Belt Conference West Division. ASUJ improved its total wins over the previous season by four and moved up three places in the league's West Division standings.
- ◆ Men's basketball head coach John Brady was named the Sun Belt Conference and USBWA's District VII Coach of the Year.
- ◆ The women's bowling team made its third consecutive trip to the NCAA Championships this spring, advancing to the semifinals while finishing the season with a 79-40 record. Marissa Martinek and Samantha Santoro were both All-America selections.
- ◆ Lloyd du Preez became the first ASUJ golfer to qualify for an NCAA Regional tournament since 1998.

SPECIAL EVENTS & FACILITIES:

- ◆ A \$250,000 donation to Red Wolves Athletics from alumni and longtime supporters Scott and Kay Dawson matched the second largest gift in the department's history and is being used to improve the academic environment for all student-athletes.
- ◆ In conjunction with a \$150,000 donation from ASUJ alumnus and football letterman Steve Bryant, ASUJ has provided naming rights to the head football coach's suite in honor of the Steve Bryant family. The Suite has been enhanced with a detailed archway, artwork and photos of all the head football coaches in ASUJ history.
- ◆ A dedication ceremony was held for the "Arkansas State Lettermen's Arch and Walkway," located at ASUJ Stadium and featuring an attractive arch and personalized brick

pavers honoring all ASUJ lettermen, past, present, future or deceased.

- ◆ First-class renovations to the men's and women's basketball and volleyball locker rooms were completely finished, significantly increasing their size and giving them a state-of-the-art look with new amenities and lounge areas.
- ◆ Renovations to the media/film room in the Convocation Center were completed with wall graphics, a media work area, carpeting, paint and theater seating with leather chairs that have ASUJ logos embroidered on them.
- ◆ ASUJ announced Tailgate City will include reserved tailgate spaces on the grassy area along Johnson Avenue for Red Wolf Club members. This addition to Tailgate City has been named Red Wolf Run.
- ◆ A record-breaking 71 teams participated in the 2009 A-State Golf Classic at the Hot Springs Country Club. The Verizon Red Wolf Classic and Rachel Stewart Memorial Golf Tournament also enjoyed record years.
- ◆ Neil Abel, Gene Bradley, David Faught and Kelly Riley, were inducted into the ASUJ Athletic Hall of Honor.
- ◆ Nelson Catalina, who led ASUJ to four NIT appearances as head men's basketball coach, was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Fame on February 19.
- ◆ The women's soccer team defeated UCA in its season opener in front of a school-record crowd of 712. While the team drew just one crowd of over 300 in 2008-09, it surpassed 300 fans in four of its first five home games last season.

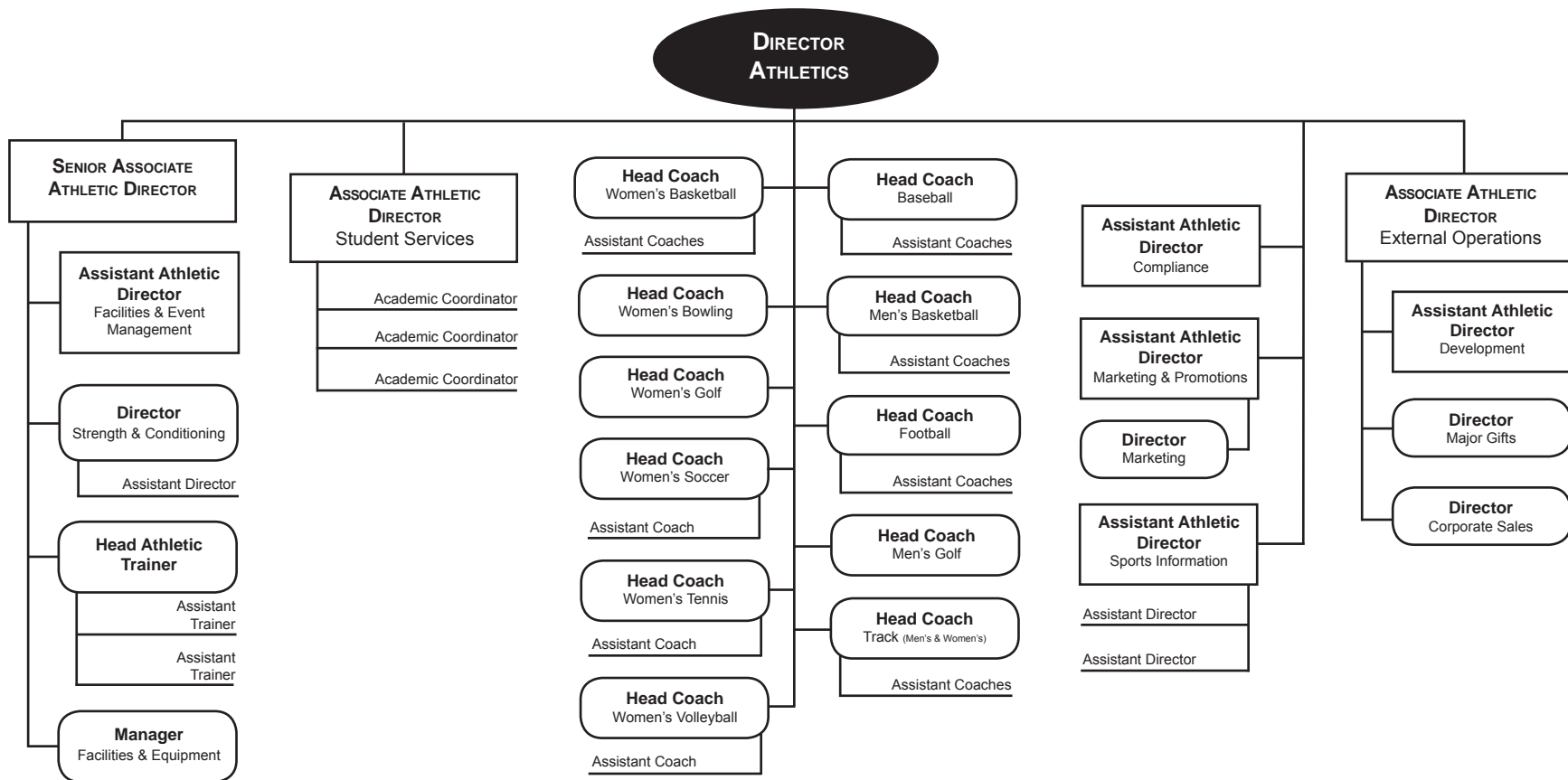

ASU Employees are assigned to a primary occupational activity category according to the following EEOC* definitions:

Faculty - All persons whose specific assignments customarily are made for the purpose of conducting instruction, research, or public service as a principal activity and who hold academic rank titles of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, lecturer, or any equivalent.

Executive/Administrative/Managerial - All persons whose assignments require primary (and major) responsibility for management of the institution, or a customarily recognized department or subdivision thereof. Assignments require the performance of work directly related to management policies or general business operations of the institution, department, or subdivision, etc. Assignments in this category customarily and regularly require the incumbent to exercise discretion and independent judgement and to direct the work of others.

Professional/Non-Faculty - All persons employed for the primary purpose of performing academic support, student service, and institutional support activities, whose assignments would require either college graduation or experience of such kind and amount as to provide a comparable background.

Technical/Paraprofessional - All persons whose assignments require specialized knowledge or skills which may be acquired through experience or academic work, such as offered in many 2-year technical institutes, junior colleges, or through equivalent on-the-job training.

Clerical/Secretarial - All persons whose assignments typically are associated with clerical activities or are specifically of a secretarial nature.

Skilled Craft - All persons whose assignments typically require special manual skills and a thorough and comprehensive knowledge of the processes involved in the work, acquired through on-the-job training and experience or through apprenticeship or other formal training programs.

Service/Maintenance - All persons whose assignments require limited degrees of previously acquired skills and knowledge and in which workers perform duties which result in or contribute to the comfort, convenience, and hygiene of personnel and the student body or which contribute to the upkeep and care of buildings, facilities, or grounds of the institutional property.

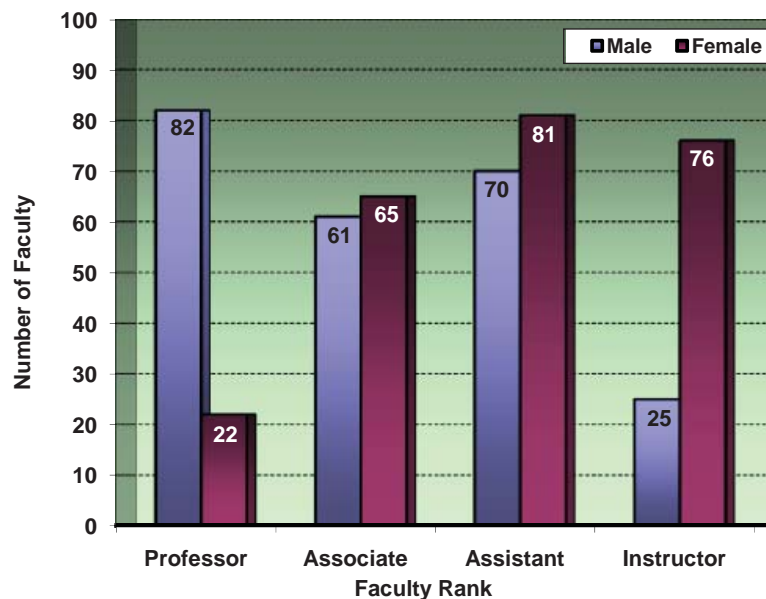

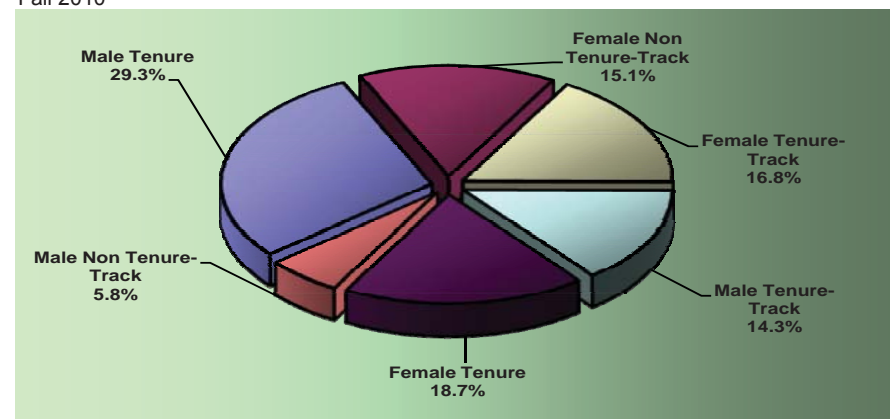

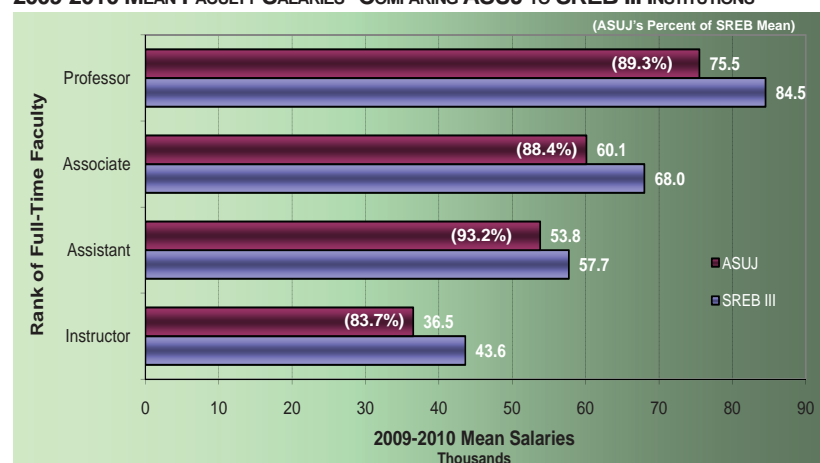

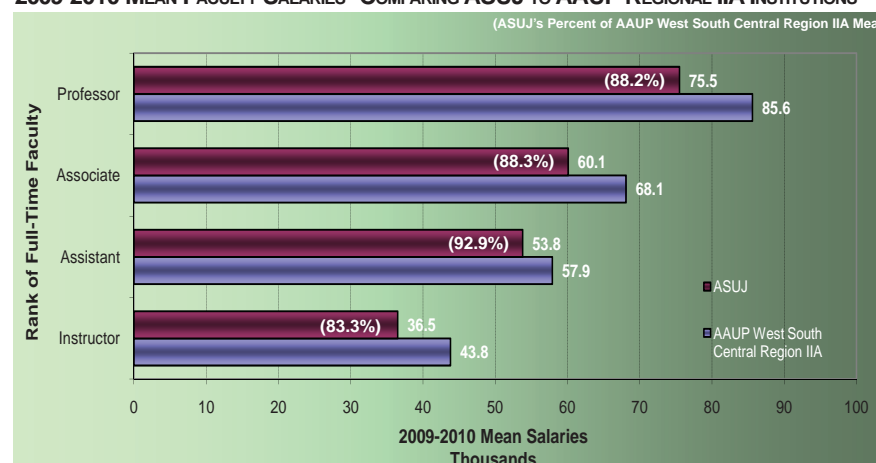

The Dean B. Ellis Library, centrally located in an eight-story building, functions as an educational center for the community. The Library of Congress classification system is used for the arrangement of books and media, and an online catalog provides access to the library's physical collections. The library meets the informational needs of the university by offering a variety of services. A staff of 13 professional librarians and 21 support personnel acquire, organize and service the collection, and provide a variety of library services. Reference librarians assist users in locating information and in using the library. The reference staff also offers an active library instruction program which reaches numerous university classes. The library provides access to hundreds of online databases and search services via links on the library's web site. Materials that are not contained in the library's collection are accessible by interlibrary loan through the OCLC network.

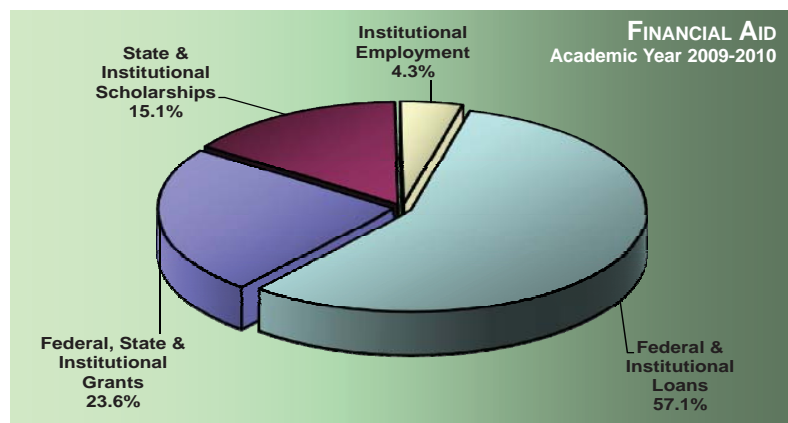

Not only can students obtain federal aid, state aid and privately funded scholarships, but ASUJ also offers several types of institutional scholarship packages to qualifying Arkansas residents and non-residents. The scholarships are primarily awarded based on ACT scores, GPA's and/or academic achievement. Institutional scholarships available include the following: ASTATE Scholar, Leadership, Pride, and Spirit; Beyond Boundaries; High School Honor Award; Transfer; and Out-of-State Scholarships. 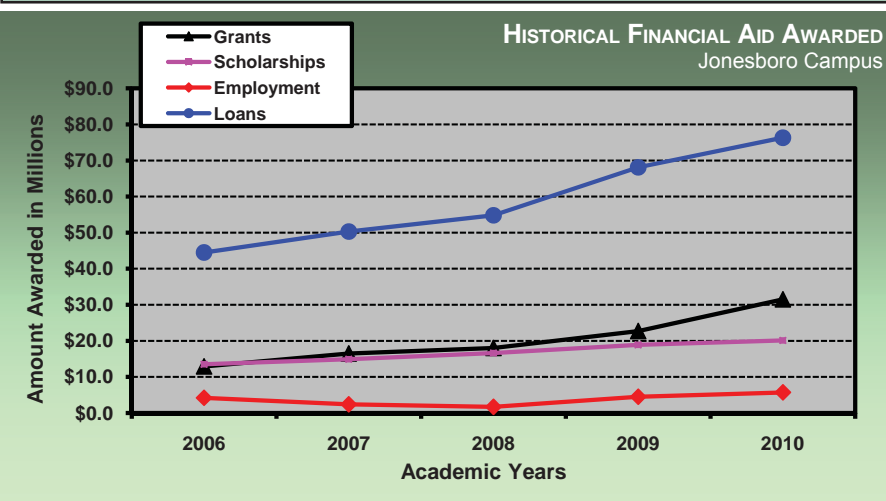

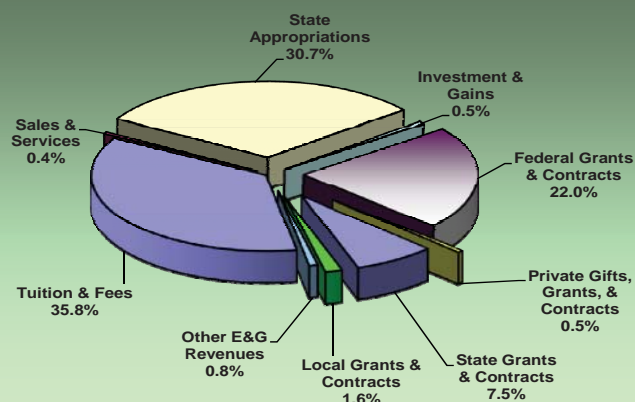

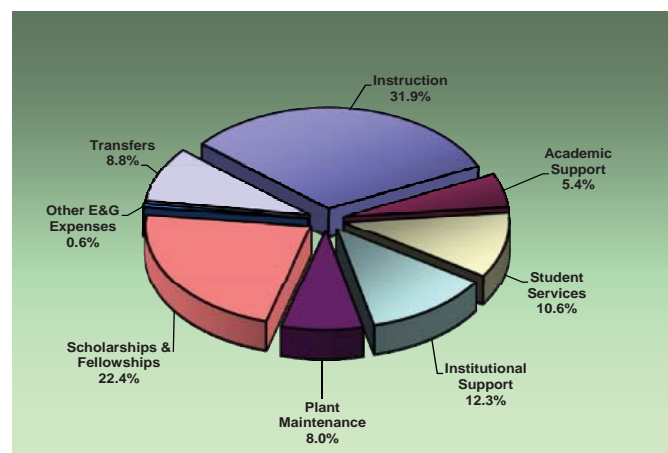

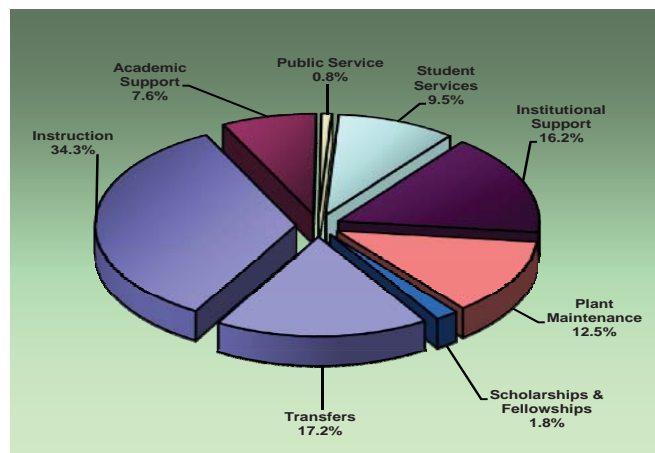

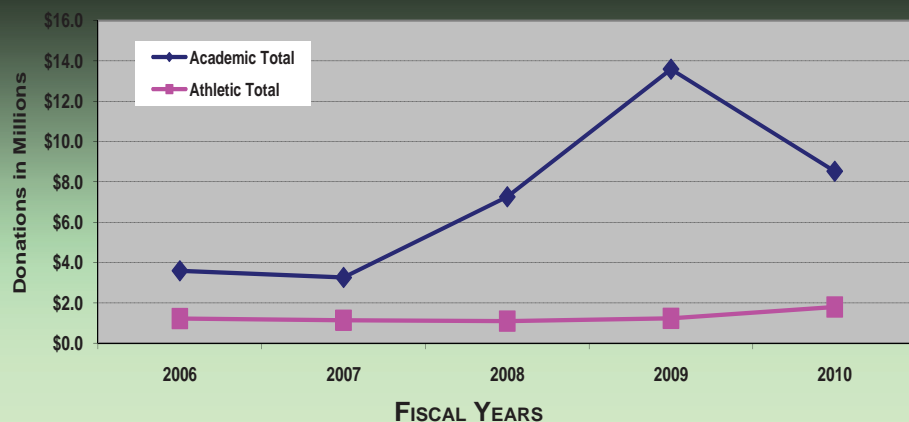

ASUJ saw significant changes over the past year including renovations in the Student Union which included alternations to the Food Court and subdivided the former fitness exercise club space into meeting rooms, multicultural and nontraditional lounges, and an internet cafe with a Starbucks Coffee space. Construction on campus included putting finishing touches on the Red Wolf Den, the Red Wolf Center, and two Honors Living/Learning Communities that house ROTC and STEM.

A 1,200 square foot structure donated to ASUJ by the Scott House family will provide research and ancillary support spaces for programs of the College of Sciences and Mathematics. Additional construction projects underway include the Marion Berry Parkway, the Liberal Arts Building and other projects and renovations.

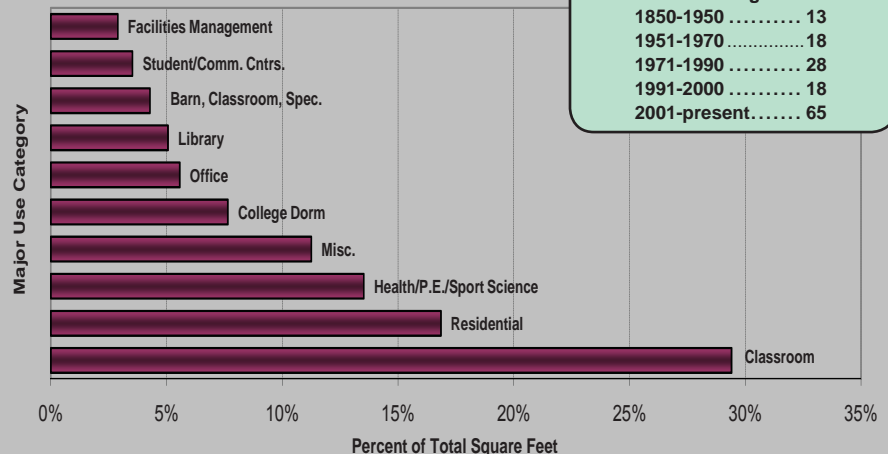
